Message from the Acting Executive Director

Let me begin by saying that I was not the Executive Director for the 2015-2016 fiscal year. That post was filled by Stephen Alexander who, after 25 years of dedicated service in the field of HIV, decided it was time to move on to new adventures. We wish him all the best!

Over the past 30 years AIDS New Brunswick has been at the forefront of HIV, STIs, and hepatitis C, and I'm proud to have been a part of that work for the past 6 years. From Prevention to Education to Support, the agency has more than left its mark on New Brunswick, and I am honored that the Board of Directors has entrusted me at the helm of AIDS NB during this transitional period.

This past year has witnessed some astounding results. Serving 293 people in Fredericton and 65 people in Miramichi, the prevention programs distributed 19,873 condoms and 185,416 sterile syringes. With 59 presentations/workshops, 6 health fair information displays, and 5 community events our education programs reached 3,641 people from all over New Brunswick, with a particular focus on the northern Francophone communities. And, through our support programs, we continue to offer aid to PHAs, and have leveraged our relationship with the Fredericton Downtown Community Health Centre to offer a monthly hep C support group and to maintain bi-weekly STBBI testing at our Fredericton office.

We continue to build new relationships with organizations and agencies to educate and build capacity, help break down barriers that stand in the face of the people we serve, and to reach new people who may need our help too. For many people, HIV/AIDS, STIs, and hepatitis are not at the forefront of their mind. Stigma and stereotyping would have them believe that neither they nor anyone they know can be affected by STBBIs, and this misconception is what puts people at the most risk: Risk of exposure, risk of transmission, and risk of intentionally or unintentionally discriminating against someone who is affected.

With 20 percent of those living with HIV in Canada unaware that they are living positive we have more than our fair share of work cut out for us. We'll continue to work to prevent new infections, offer accessible testing, educate about STBBIs, and support those living with and affected by STBBIs.

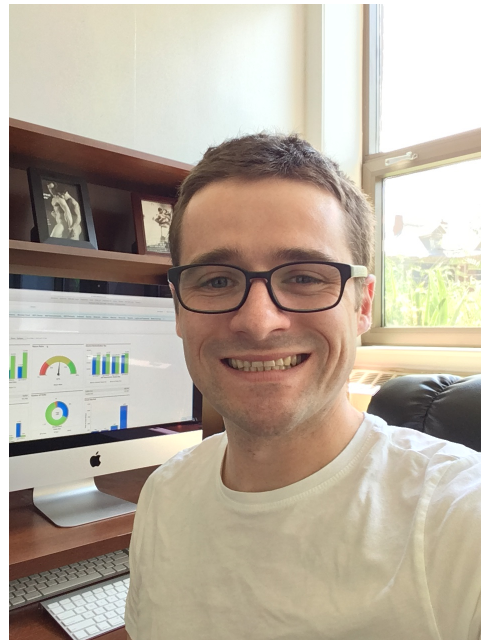

Objectives

Increase knowledge among <i>vulnerable populations</i> about HIV/AIDS prevention and testing through presentations, workshops, and distribution of information and materials.
Improve access to prevention programs and support programs or treatment services for <i>vulnerable populations</i> through the delivery of programs, distribution of information and condoms, partnership activities, and referrals.
Increase awareness among <i>People Living with HIV/AIDS</i> about care, treatment, and support options through the provision of programs, information and referrals.
Increase knowledge among <i>People Living with HIV/AIDS</i> about healthy behaviours and practices.
Improve attitudes among the <i>general population</i> towards HIV, persons living with HIV/AIDS (PLWHIV/AIDS) and vulnerable to HIV, which will be done through community events and partnership work related to addressing social stigma, poverty, homelessness, and other issues related to the social determinants of health.
Increase the capacity of <i>staff, board, and other volunteers</i> to sustain and to strengthen the organization through training, planning, evaluation, fund raising, and human resource management.
Improve collaboration across sectors and stakeholders to address HIV/AIDS through working group participation, network participation and other activities.

These 115 red scarves (49 knit/crochet, 66 fleece) were graciously donated to us by many great community organization and individuals including:

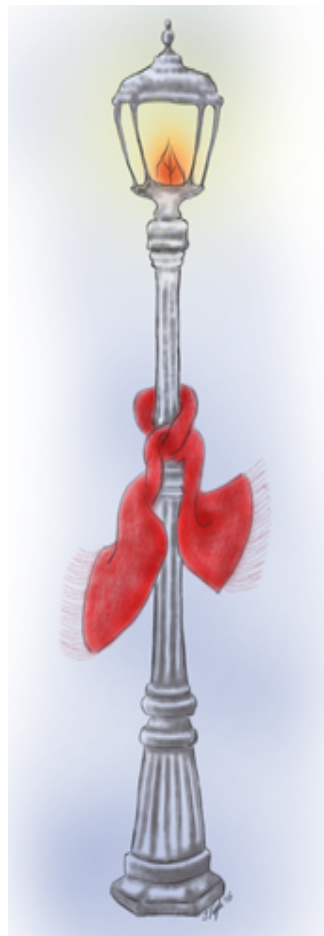

World Hepatitis Day Community BBQ

On July 28th AIDS New Brunswick, in partnership with UNB Nursing and Miramichi Youth House, hosted World Hepatitis Day community BBQs in Fredericton and Miramichi. This annual event is an opportunity to give the community information about HIV, HCV, and STI testing in Fredericton and Miramichi. This event also provided the community with the opportunity to learn more about the programs offered by AIDS NB. Bi-weekly testing continues to be available on site at AIDS NB's office in Fredericton.



Car Smash

On October 4th AIDS New Brunswick partnered with the University of New Brunswick's Aitken House for the 5th annual Smash Stigma Car Smash. For the past five years, the Men of Aitken have hosted an annual auction car smash at UNB with proceeds going to AIDS New Brunswick. The event raised awareness about the issues related to HIV/AIDS in our province and the stigma associated with the disease. Thank you to Aitken House for working hard to make this event a success, UNB for allowing the event, AA Towing for donating the car and tows, everyone

who donated T.V.'s and other assorted items for smashing, and everyone who came out to support AIDS New Brunswick.

Partnership with the Faith Community

AIDS New Brunswick continues to work in partnership with the faith community. Once again this year St. James Presbyterian Church in Hanwell supported the Scotiabank AIDS Walk for Life by forming a team, raising money and participating in the walk. The congregation also donated more than 50 red scarves to the Red Scarf Campaign. We thank them for their continued support.

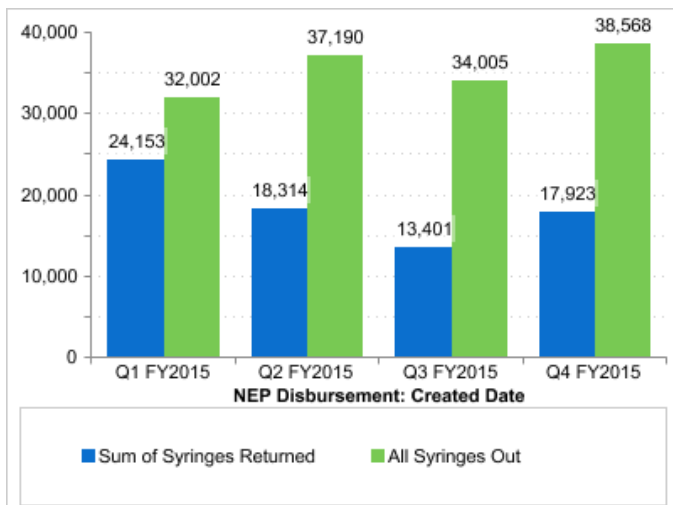

Prevention Programs

Fredericton Needle Exchange Program

In its 16th year of operation the Fredericton Needle Exchange Program (FNEP) continues to experience record numbers. This past year the FNEP served 293 people, 130 of whom were new to the program. Those 293 people accessed the program a total of 1,738 times. The FNEP distributed a grand total of 141,765 sterile syringes, 1,721 safer smoking kits, and 19,254 condoms.

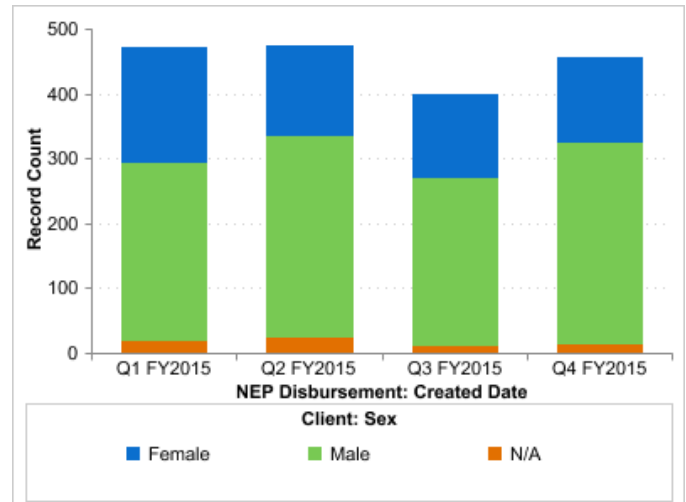


FNEP Syringes In/Out

When comparing these figures to the 2014-2015 fiscal year we can see that there is a steady and consistent increase in all areas:

- Syringes Up 26%
- Service Users Up 19%
- Visits Up 12%

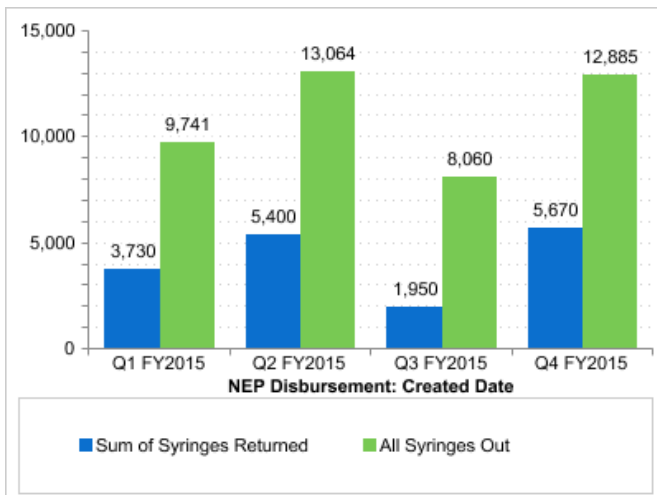
- Condoms Up 6%
- Safer smoking kits Up 412%

Miramichi Needle Exchange Program

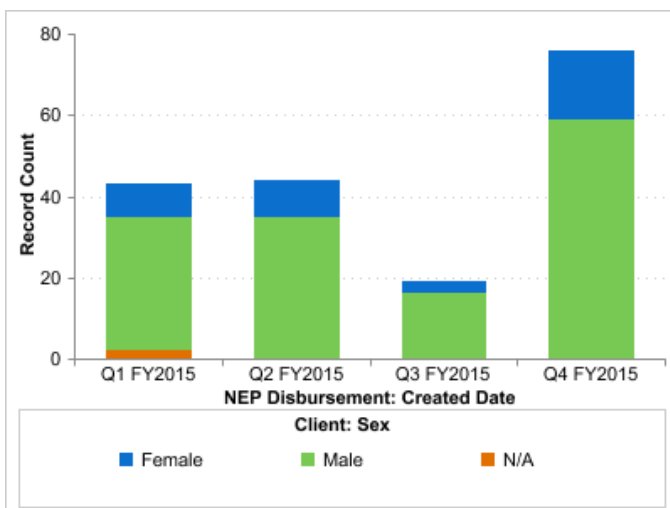
The Miramichi Needle Exchange Program (MNEP), now in its 4th year of operation, continues to be a valuable service to its community. This past year the MNEP served 65 people, 17 of whom were new to the program. Those 65 people accessed the program a total of 180 times. The MNEP distributed 43,650 sterile syringes, 206 safer smoking kits, and 619 condoms.

When comparing these numbers to the 2014-2015 fiscal year we can see both increases and decreases:

- Syringes Up 9%
- Service Users Down 52%
- Visits Down 57%
- Condoms Down 57%
- Safer smoking kits Down 8%

Like last year, we are experiencing a decrease in the number of service users and visits to the MENP, but an increase in

syringes distributed. Again, we attribute this to the nature of a rural needle exchange program where, because the MNEP serves many rural northern NB communities, it is commonplace to have one person picking up supplies for many others.

Combination of FNEP and MNEP

Between its two Needle Exchange Programs, AIDS NB served 358 people, 147 of whom were new to the programs. Those 358 people accessed the programs 1,918 times, and took 185,415 sterile syringes, 1,927 safer smoking kits, and 19,873 condoms.



Education Programs

Overview

It's been a very busy year for our Education Programs. We've conducted 59 presentations and workshops, held 6 information displays, and participated in 5 community events. All told, last year we reached an estimated total of 3600 people across the province. Our tried-and-true "HIV 101" presentation, covering the basics of transmission and prevention for HIV/AIDS, STIs, and Hepatitis C, was presented 43 times to a variety of audiences, including presentations at 13 secondary and post-secondary schools. We've also been actively delivering this presentation to a variety of community groups and organizations, including the Sarah Tracy Centre, the John Howard Society, and the Fredericton Youth Feminists.

Evolution

In addition to HIV 101, this year we've debuted a new workshop: Sexual Diversity 101 (SD 101). SD 101 (originally known as Queer 101) is a highly interactive workshop designed to provide frontline workers with the knowledge and skills necessary to create services and environments that are welcoming and supportive of individuals of all gender identities and sexual orientations.

In 2015-2016 this workshop was delivered three times, with participants including public health nurses, social work students, and current social workers. Following its successful debut, we've already had numerous requests to present this workshop in the coming fiscal year.

2015-2016 has also been a time of expansion and change. We've continued to expand the reach of our presentations, particularly towards the North-West of the province, visiting schools in Edmundston, Saint-Léonard, Campbellton and Dalhousie. We've also begun working alongside

representatives from the Université de Moncton Campus d'Edmundston (UMCE), and Vitalité Public Health Region 4, in the hopes of offering HIV, Hepatitis, and STI information as part of a series of workshops being planned for post-secondary students in Edmundston. In addition to our on-going workshop series at both Chrysalis House and Miramichi Youth House, we were also invited to the John Howard Society in Fredericton to provide safer sex and healthy relationships workshops.

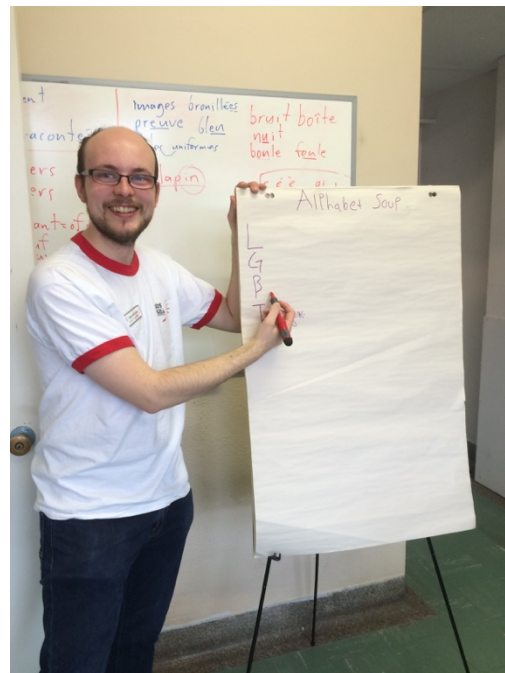

Going Forward

We have lots to look forward to in the coming fiscal year. Our Sexual Diversity 101 Workshop has already been requested numerous times, by a growing list of

organizations located in various regions of the province. We've also begun adapting our workshops to new audiences: an adapted version of Sexual Diversity 101 has been developed specifically for individuals working with older adult and senior citizen populations in our province, and a modified version of our HIV 101 presentation is beginning to make its rounds through middle schools. Presentation delivery is also expanding, with open training sessions proving quite popular.

Support Programs

Another year is in the books for AIDS New Brunswick and its support program. We've been keen on making sure we're able to provide information, education, and support to those living with or affected by HIV/AIDS, hepatitis C, and other STBBIs.

Throughout the year we've continued to gain momentum in our hepatitis C drop-in group in partnership with the Downtown Community Health Clinic. The monthly group sees between 12 to 15 people, and provides an opportunity for those affected by hepatitis C to learn more about living with the illness. Several UNB nursing

students have been involved with the group, which in turn gives them a first-hand look at the issues surrounding those living with hepatitis C.

We also rolled out our first webinar and fact sheet on hepatitis C. This ongoing series of webinars will help give the public a better understanding of hepatitis C by looking at prevalence rates, routes of transmission, treatment, and harm reduction practices.

Hepatitis C: Get the Facts

Did You Know?




- Hepatitis is Greek for "inflammation of the liver"
- Hepatitis C is transmitted through blood-to-blood contact
- There is no vaccine or immunity for Hepatitis C
- Most people do not show any signs or symptoms until many years after getting hepatitis C
- Travels through blood stream to the liver where it infects liver cells
- Can result in extensive liver damage
- 170 million people affected worldwide
- 1 in 100 Canadians affected in their lifetime
- An estimated 20% of Canadians are living with hepatitis C and do not know it
- NB Hepatitis C rates highest among youth (age 20-29)*
- Hepatitis C has 6 genotypes
- Hepatitis C can be an acute or chronic virus.

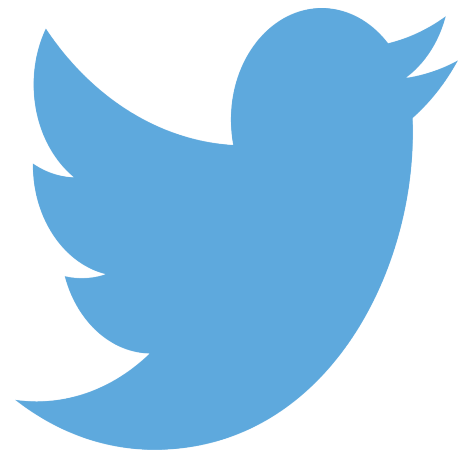
